2015 REVIEW

1. General

The Communist Party was founded in 1920 as the Communist Party of Great Britain and was reestablished in 1988 as the Communist Party of Britain. Its activities are based on the theory and practice of Marxism-Leninism and its organization conforms to the principles of democratic centralism by combining the democratic participation of the membership with an elected, centralized leadership capable of directing the Party's activities. 3. MEMBERSHIP

The reduction in the number of members in 2015 reflects a more strict interpretation of the rules relating to members in arears. A significant number of these lapsed members subsequently renewed their membership in 2016.



Since March 2013 members' dues have been held at the levels set by the Party at its 52nd Congress in 2012. They are based on members' self-declared gross income.

4. Review of Financial Activities

The Surplus for the year was £9,604 (2014 £7367 deficit). With net assets at 31 December 2015 of $\pounds 20,632$ (2014 $\pounds 11,028$), the underlying financial position of the Party remains sound and the budget for 2016, approved by the Executive Committee, will underpin this situation.

5a. Activities in the year: extra-parliamentary

The Party organised successful mobilisations for the People's Assembly in central London and elsewhere The Party assisted its district committees to organise local CP involvement in annual national labour movement festivals (London May Day, Tolpuddle, Burston, Durham Miners etc). This support included the production and distribution of special editions of Unity! bulletins and mobilising teams of comrades to enhance the presence of the Party and the Morning Star at these events. The Party asked its members not to engage as Labour Party supporters or trade unionists in the election of a new Labour Leader but welcomed the election of Jeremy Corbyn

The Party continues to support the work of trade unions and to win them over to progressive policies. Unity! bulletins were published and distributed at major union conferences. The Party continued to promote the Peoples Charter and support the People's Assembly. Marxist Leninist political education was given prominence at the Red Star Festival at Clerkenwell organized jointly with the Morning Star and the Marx Memorial Library. Communism amongst young people was encouraged and supported through the work of the Young Communist League (YCL). The Party continued its support for the work of the National Assembly of Women.

The Party supports the Morning Star, the world's only English language socialist daily newspaper and continues to deplore the efforts of the mass media, including the BBC, to ignore its existence. The Party and its branches continue to encourage local readers and supporters groups and to hold regular collections for the Fighting Fund. Five editions of the Party's theoretical journal, Communist Review, were published. The Party supports the work of the Marx Memorial Library and jointly organizes with it the annual Marx Oration at Highgate Cemetery.

5b. Activities in the year: electoral

The electoral system in the England, Wales and Scotland starves the Communist Party of media coverage, effectively fines it for participating in parliamentary and regional elections by the imposition of election deposits and fails to provide the free use of public buildings for public election meetings as required under the Representation of the People Act 1983. These distortions of the electoral process together with press ownership in the UK favors the large established parties,



enabling them to rely on mass media to get their message across. While the growth of social media is beginning to undermine this advantage, it still remains intact. Nevertheless, the Communist Party fielded 9 candidates in the general election and collected in total 1,229 votes. Laura-Jane Rossington, who stood for the Party in Plymouth Sutton and Devonport; was at just over 18 the youngest candidate to stand in the general election in England.

The Communist Party does not engage in politics in Northern Ireland and encourages communist sympathisers there to join the Communist Party of Ireland. This is in line with its policy of encouraging its members who move abroad to join the communist party of the country to which they have moved.

6. International Activities

The Party is part of the international communist and workers party movement, information on which can be found at www.solidnet.org. Priority was again given to solidarity work with the peoples of Palestine, Cuba and Venezuela, to campaigning to oppose further foreign adventures, whether in the Middle East or elsewhere, and to opposing proscriptions against communist parties anywhere in the world including the European Union and Ukraine. The Party sent delegates to the 17th International Meeting of Communist and Workers Parties in Turkey, sent fraternal/sororal delegates to the DKP Congress in Germany and participated in the Avante and Fete de l'humanite festivals in Portugal and France Support was given to a number of progressive women's organisations, including the Iraqi Women's League and the Democratic Organisation of Iranian Women.
