The Fundraising & Operations and Campaigns Directors were appointed in early 2014 in preparation for the 2014 European and 2015 General Elections. Their roles replaced that of the outgoing CEO. Towards the end of 2015 these posts were once again replaced by an incoming CEO.

#### Membership

As at 31 December 2015 there were 63,219 Members of the Party (2014 30,900).

#### **Accounting units**

As at 31 December 2015 the Party had 264 (2014 - 220) Accounting Units registered with the Electoral Commission.

#### Party Leader, Natalie Bennett

The year 2015 saw the Green Party membership more than double in size, in what was known as the "Green surge", and we won a place at two of the televised leader debates after strong public backing. We won 1.1 million votes in the general election, more than in every previous general election added together, and stood in 93% of seats (well above the 75% target set the previous September). Under the first-past-the-post electoral system this failed however to produce extra seats, although we saw a 23% swing to us in Bristol West, with second places also in Sheffield Central and Liverpool Riverside, and Caroline Lucas significantly increased her majority in Brighton Pavilion.

#### Deputy Leaders, Amelia Womack and Shahrar Ali

In 2015, we had as a key focus nationwide, campaigning for the general election. We visited target constituencies, supported local parties and candidates, addressed rallies on platforms organised by anti-austerity, environmental and social justice campaign groups. We continued to raise the Party's profile and policies through broadcast and social media and played a full part in steering Party strategy through GPEx, political committee and conferences. Planning and preparation continued for the London and Welsh Assembly elections (in which we were candidates) and the European Referendum. An important campaign of the year was a visit to the Calais jungle to learn about and express solidarity with the plight of refugees.

#### Wales Green Party Leader, Pippa Bartolotti

The main focus for 2015 has been the Welsh Assembly elections. Increased membership and a higher profile caused by our inclusion in both Welsh Leader Debates allowed for reasonable buoyancy of hopes for the election of at least one candidate on the Regional List. We employed 2 more part time staff – a Press Officer and Campaigns Manager with financial assistance from National Party, for which we are grateful.

The 2015 General Elecion was good training ground for our 36 candidates and their teams, and we are pleased that the majority will be going forwards into the Welsh Assembly elections with a good degree of experience.

#### Chair, Richard Mallender

Following the surge in membership last year we have focussed efforts on serving the needs of those new to the party while also preparing for the London and Welsh Assembly elections and many local elections around England & Wales.

We have restructured our staff with the appointment of a new Chief Executive Officer, who replaced the outgoing Directors and relocated to new premises at the end of March 2016. I look forward to continued development of the Party's capacity at all levels; locally, regionally and nationally.

#### Policy Development Co-ordinators, Sam Riches and Samantha Pancheri

The Policy Development Co-ordinator (a role which was shared for the first three and final four months of 2015) was assisted by members of Policy Committee to fulfil a number of key functions in policy development, supporting our elected members on policy issues and advising on the Party response to events. We have given guidance to members on the preparation of conference motions, and helped to interpret party policy for members of the public, our press team and local councillors. We were assisted by paid staff - a Policy Communications Manager and two Policy Officers - for most of 2015.

#### Elections Co-ordinator, Judy Maciejowska

In 2015 I coordinated and worked with staff to implement our General Election strategy. I visited our target constituencies including Brighton Pavilion and Bristol West. I helped Bristol West with their plans for setting up a campaign management structure and worked with other officers over the selection of a slate of candidates in 90% of seats. I managed the production and publication of the Party's general election manifesto and advised staff on the management of the Freepost leaflet. After the election I worked on future strategic plans and interviewed candidates for the posts of Head of Communication and Head of Party Development (no appointments were made). I convened meetings of the Elections Committee and took part in all GPEx (Green Party Executive) collective duties.

#### External Communications Co-ordinators, Penny Kemp, Clare Phipps and Matt Hawkins

The general election of 2015 was a busy time for the media team. We dealt with the BBC and lawyers to ensure we got representation in the televised debates. Our groundbreaking election broadcast got rave reviews and broke all records for political advertising. Media scrutiny was more intense than ever before and we work with a much smaller media team than any of the other Parties.

Members of the media team deserve our heartfelt thanks for the tremendous effort they have given to the Green Party over the year. We were sad that despite the record number of votes, we only managed to retain our MP. Yet Caroline Lucas is an exceptional MP, increasing her majority and winning numerous awards for her dedication and commitment to environmental and social justice. We were proud to play our part in that and prepare for the assembly and local elections in 2016.

#### Internal Communications Co-ordinator, Clifford Fleming

Since being elected in 2015 I have prioritised making Green Activist a regular newsletter to members, now received monthly. Central communications have been streamlined. Where possible communications will now come from as local as possible to members - either from local parties, regional parties or liberation groups.

I have led on the Co-Option (appointment not election) of Green Party Executive members - including that of Finance Coordinator, Campaigns Coordinator, and Management Coordinator.

A focus of mine has also been on creating a plan for updating the Members' Website, which has been passed on to staff to implement over the coming year.

#### Equality & Diversity Co-ordinator, Charlene Concepcion

We have been engaged in a number of projects. We launched the BME strategy which has looked at the challenges and ways forward in engaging BME members and supporters. We are now looking more broadly at Equality and Diversity strategy, training and policy.

We have supported the Equality and Diversity Committee, which now includes representatives from liberation groups in the Party and continued to support the development of these groups and newer groups. We have worked with Conferences Committee to help improve inclusivity and accessibility at Conference.

Additionally, we have given advice on complaints regarding equality and diversity.

#### International Co-ordinator, Derek Wall

2015 saw the Green Party of England and Wales make a successful bid to host the Global Greens Congress which will take place in Liverpool in spring 2017. We supported the General Election work of the Party. Work was also done to promote solidarity with Rojava, the autonomous mainly Kurdish area of Syria which is advocating a feminist, ecological and self-governing society. Delegates attended the European Green Party Councils in Croatia and France. Through the Westminster Foundation for Democracy we ran training events for the East African Federation of Green Parties.

#### **Publications Co-ordinator, Dee Searle**

The Publications Coordinator is responsible for ensuring a cost-effective, strategic approach to Green Party publications which accords with the Party's policy and broader strategy, and is aligned with both External and Internal Party Communications. For most of 2015, the role was fulfilled on an interim basis following the resignation of the original incumbent due to personal circumstances. I was elected to the position in September 2015.

A priority for the latter part of 2015 was to renegotiate the external publishing contract for Green World magazine. The objective was to transfer the publication from print to a mainly digital format, with the aim of saving money, reaching more members, reflecting topical issues and integrating with other member communication vehicles such as Green Activist. The transfer has been achieved and received a largely positive reception.

#### **Financial Review**

The Party's income grew dramatically in 2015 as membership surged and the Party raised funds to contest a record number of seats at the General Election in May. Altogether the Party's income grew from £1,841,344 in 2014 to £3,048,921 in 2015, an increase of 66%. The principal drivers of this growth were an increase in membership income from £431,411 to £1,058,749 and an increase in donations from £930,100 to £1,526,449. The growth in membership also led to a substantial increase in income from the Party's affinity schemes with green businesses and from Conferences which were attended by record numbers of members and supporters.

Factors which led to increased income, namely an increased membership and profile, also resulted in increased expenditure. The Party's expenditure therefore grew as funds were applied to the General Election campaign, enabling us to field a record number of 500 candidates, and to additional staff to manage the Party's growth. A number of factors meant that this growth in expenditure outpaced the growth in income, with the result that the Party incurred a major deficit and the Party's balance sheet was negative at the end of 2015. The scale of growth in membership and donations put great pressure on the Party's administrative systems and it was not until the autumn of 2015 that investment in systems and procedures established tight control over transactions, and to the creation of a network of regional campaign coordinators. Grants to local parties rose as the Party invested in setting up many new local parties throughout the country, and in the creation of a network of regional campaign coordinators. And the cost of running the Party's spring and autumn conferences rose sharply as the growth in membership wishing to attend Conference meant that we had to hire larger venues with better facilities than in the past.

The largest single item of expenditure, at £1,176,979 or 39% of total income, was on staffing. As membership and participation in elections grew the Party invested extensively in campaigns and policy staff, in an expansion of its digital and communications teams, and in the creation of a 15 strong network of regional campaign staff. Following the General election there was a small drop in membership and a fall away in the value of donations and fundraising appeals. The Party took some time to adjust to this post-election environment approving reductions in staffing levels and expenditure at the end of 2015.

Since the year end the Party has been running a balanced budget and is confident that this will remain the case. The Party is forecasting a reduction in the negative balance on the balance sheet by the end of 2016. At the start of 2016 significant savings were made in the Party's staffing budgets as we shifted from a General Election to a long-term staffing structure. A number of non-priority national party programmes were also suspended to ensure that the Party's finances would stabilise. Strict financial controls and robust systems are now in place and there is close scrutiny of monthly budgets and cash flow by the finance team, by GPEX, and by AFCom (the party's Administration and Finance Committee). GPEX has adopted a plan for sustainable growth in its finances in the year ahead including a commitment to both expand and diversify its funding base to reduce the overall level of reliance on membership income. The Party has prepared and reviewed budgets and cash flow projections to the end of 2017 and is satisfied that it will be able to meet all its liabilities, principally the payment of capitations to regional and local parties, and on this basis the Party considers it appropriate to prepare the accounts on a going concern basis.

#### Statement of Registered Treasurer's Responsibilities

The Registered Treasurer is reponsible for preparing the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations. The Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 requires the Registered Treasurer of the Party to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Party and of the surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Registered Treasurer is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then prepare them consistently;
- make reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, providing details and explanations of any departures in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Party will continue in operation.

Section 41 of the Act requires that the Registered Treasurer is responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Party at that time and to enable her to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Act. Section 45 of the Act requires that the Registered Treasurer is responsible for delivery of the statement of accounts to The Electoral Commission by the required deadline.

# Independent Auditor's Report to the Registered Treasurer of The Green Party of England and Wales

We have audited the financial statements of The Green Party of England and Wales for the year ended 31 December 2015 which comprise the Income and Expenditure Account (incorporating a statement of Income and Retained Earnings), the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cash Flows and the related notes. These financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein and the requirements of FRS102, The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (September 2015)

This report is made solely to the Registered Treasurer of The Green Party, in accordance with the Party's rules and section 43 of the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Treasurer, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

#### Respective responsibilities of the Registered Treasurer and auditors

As described in the Statement of Registered Treasurer's Responsibilities on page 10, the Treasurer is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view. We are required to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's ethical standards for auditors.

We have been appointed as auditors under section 43 of the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 in accordance with regulations made under section 44 of that Act. Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with applicable law.

#### Scope of the audit of the financial statements

An audit involves obtaining evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements sufficient to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or error. This includes an assessment of: whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Party's circumstances and have been consistently applied and adequately disclosed; the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the Treasurer; and the overall presentation of the financial statements.

In addition, we read all the financial and non-financial information in the Report of the Party Officers to identify material inconsistencies with the audited financial statements. If we become aware of any apparent material misstatements or inconsistencies we consider the implications for our report.

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland (September 2015) and the Statement of Accounts Guidance Notes issued by The Electoral Commission.

The Party has adopted FRS 102 for the first time in the year ended 31 December 2015. In preparing the accounts, the Executive has considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 a restatement of comparative items was needed. No restatements were required as those items identified as potentially requiring adjustment were not deemed to be material.

The Green Party is a political party within the United Kingdom, constituted under the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000. The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency of the Party. The Party's Headquarters and principal place of business is given on page 2.

#### Going concern

As can be seen in the accounts, the Party experienced growth in expenditure that outpaced growth in income in 2015, with the result that the Party incurred a substantial deficit and the Party's balance sheet was negative at the end of 2015. As discussed in the Report of the Party Officers in detail, there were a number of factors that contributed to this deficit.

Since the year end the Party has been running a balanced budget for 2016. On the basis of these changes we are projecting a balanced budget for 2016 as a whole. The full effect of the restructuring of costs and financial controls will be seen in the budget for 2017 – on a standstill budget in terms of membership income the reduced cost budget would result in a surplus of around £90,000 in 2017.

Strict financial controls and robust systems are now in place and there is close scrutiny of monthly budgets and cash flow by the finance team, by GPEX, and by AFCom (the party's Administration and Finance Committee). GPEX has adopted a plan for sustainable growth in its finances in the year ahead including a commitment to both expand and diversify the Party's funding base to reduce the overall level of reliance on membership income. The Party has adopted the following key principles for a sustainable financial plan:

- 1. No financial commitments should be made unless it can be shown that they are fully funded.
- 2. The Party will seek to protect the core infrastructure necessary for it to support services to members, campaigns, and its capacity to manage and grow income.
- 3. As part of its organisational plan for 2016-18 the Party has a credible strategy to grow its income from all sources and to reduce levels of reliance on members' dues.

The Party has prepared and reviewed budgets and cash flow projections to the end of 2017 and is satisfied that it will be able to meet all its liabilities as they fall due, principally the payment of capitations to regional and local parties, and on this basis the Party considers it appropriate to prepare the accounts on a going concern basis.

#### Accounting policies (continued)

#### Judgements in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgement in applying the Party's accounting policies:

No signficant judgements, further to that surrounding going concern as noted under the Basis of preparation paragraph above, have been made by management in preparing these financial statements.

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

#### Income recognition

Income is recognised when all of the following conditions have been met:

- The Party is entitled to the assets;
- It is probable that the asset will be received; and
- The value of the asset can be measured with reliability.

Applying these criteria to specific types of income results in the following treatment:

- Donations of monetary assets are recognised in the Income and Expenditure Account on receipt.
- Membership subscriptions are recognised in the Income and Expenditure Account on a cash basis. Membership income shown in the accounts is the total amount of subscriptions before deducting the capitations due to local and regional parties.
- Interest receivable is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Account on the accruals
- Revenue from the Party's sale of publications and other materials is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Account as the benefit of the goods or services is transferred to the customer.
- Legacy income is included in the Income and Expenditure Account when it becomes probable that the legacy will be received and its value can be measured with sufficient reliability (for example if advance notification of a distribution is received from the executors).
- Freepost sales are recognised in the Income and Expenditure Account on receipt.
- All other income including affiliation fees/commission is recognised on the accruals basis.

#### Expenditure recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on the accruals basis, this includes irrecoverable VAT.

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#### Accounting policies (continued)

#### Website costs

Website development costs are capitalised to the extent that the website will generate a lasting economic benefit to the Party.

#### Fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off their cost over their expected useful lives, as follows:

Office furniture and equipment - 5 years
Website - 3 years
Computer equipment - 3 years

Only items costing over £500 are capitalised.

#### Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

#### Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### Stocks

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined using the first-in, first-out (FIFO) method. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less applicable variable selling expenses.

#### Taxation

The Party is an unincorporated volunteer association and is therefore liable to corporation tax on its investment income. No deferred tax is recognised in the Party's accounts as any investment income is taxed on the same basis as it is recognised in the income and expenditure account.

#### Operating leases policy

Payments made under operating leases are charged to the Income and Expenditure Account on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

#### Pension arrangements

The Party contributes to staff member's personal pension funds and costs are charged to the Income and Expenditure Account when due.

The Fixed Assets Fund has been established to represent funds tied up in fixed assets. £1,468 has been transferred from the General Fund to represent purchases during the year.

The Greenquest fund exists to provide loans and grants to approved local and regional party projects. Its income comes from donations and interest received on the balance of funds not loaned which are held in a designated bank account.

The Leader's Project fund was established to support the work of the Party Leader.

The Climate Sense Campaign Fund was launched in the run up to COP21 that took place in Paris in November 2015. The purpose of the fund is to support our Campaign for policies that make Climate Sense in the UK and across Europe.

The General Fund represents the balance available, after the balances available to the specific funds listed above, to spend on the Party's operational activities. The balance at 31 December 2015 is negative, but steps are being taken to rectify this, as detailed in the Report of the Party Officers on page 9.

#### 15 Operating lease commitments

During the year the Party had annual operating lease commitments on office space to the sum of £17,323. (2014 - £33,896). The commitments came to an end on 31st March 2016, when a move to new premises was undertaken. The Party also had an operating lease commitment on equipment with £508 being payable within one year and £2,034 payable within five years. (2014-£108 payable within one year, £nil payable within five years)

#### 16 Related party transactions

£18,188 (2014: £13,627) was reimbursed to a total of 23 individuals who were members of the Party Executive (GPEx) or Key management personnel. The reimbursed expenditure related to travel costs and subsistence.
