STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. The accounts are prepared on a going concern basis employing the historical cost convention and conform to generally accepted accounting principles. The format of the accounts is that specified by the Electoral Commission.

2. Fixed assets have been written down to their recoverable amount. There were no movements in the year.

3. Stocks of literature and merchandise are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value.



2019 REVIEW

1. General

The Communist Party was founded in 1920 as the Communist Party of Great Britain and was reestablished in 1988 as the Communist Party of Britain. Its activities are based on the theory and practice of Marxism-Leninism and its organization employs the principles of democratic centralism, combining democratic participation of the members with an elected, centralized leadership capable of directing the Party's activities. The Party will celebrate its centenary in 2020.

The number of YCL members at 31 December 2018 has previously been under-stated, being based



on partial records kept by the Communist Party itself. The re-stated number at 31 December 2018 is an estimate. The number of YCL members 31 December 2019 is accurate and based on YCL membership records.

Members' dues are levied according to the individual member's self-assessed income. The bands employed have remained largely unchanged since April 2013.

4. Review of Financial Activities

The surplus for the year was £ 17,216 (£27,499 in 2018). In 2019 the Party ended the year with net assets of £56,541 (£39,325 at 31 December 2017). The forecast for 2019 is consistent with maintaining a satisfactory state of affairs.

5a. Activities in the year: extra-parliamentary

The Party again organised and participated in successful mobilisations in Central London and elsewhere. The Party assisted its district committees to organise local CP involvement in annual national labour movement festivals (London May Day, Tolpuddle, Durham Miners etc). This support included the production and distribution of special editions of Unity! and mobilising teams of comrades to enhance the presence of the Party and the Morning Star at these events.

The Party continues to support the work of trade unions and to win them over to progressive policies. Unity! was published and distributed at major trade union conferences. The Party continued to support the People's Assembly. Communism amongst young people was encouraged and supported through the work of the Young Communist League (YCL).

The Party continued its support for the work of the National Assembly of Women. .

The Party supports the Morning Star, the world's only English language socialist daily newspaper and continues to deplore the efforts of the mass media, including the BBC, to ignore its existence. The Party and its branches continue to encourage local readers and supporters groups and to hold regular collections for the Fighting Fund. Four editions of the Party's theoretical journal, Communist Review, were published. The Party supports the work of the Marx Memorial Library and organizes with it the annual Marx Oration at Highgate Cemetery. The Party supports Manifesto Press and through the Communist Party Heritage Fund encourages it to publish books that maintain the history and legacy of the Communist Party.

5b. Activities in the year: electoral

The Communist Party is severely handicapped when standing candidates in national elections by the first past the post electoral system, the weak control of election spending, media ownership and the way election deposits effectively fine the Party for standing candidates. A further obstacle is the widespread failure to provide the free use of public buildings for public election meetings, a required by the Representation of the People Act 1983 which, in our experience, is widely ignored.



Given its support for much of the Labour Party manifesto and the leadership provided by Jeremy Corbyn, the Communist Party once again refrained from standing candidates in the 2019 General Election. After the election, Rob Griffiths, our General Secretary, commented that Labour's shift towards a "Stop Brexit" stance, with which we disagreed, had driven millions of Labour supporters to abstain or vote to "Get Brexit Done". 52 of the 54 seats lost by Labour to the Tories had voted in 2016 to leave the EU. Britain's monopoly capitalists so feared many of Labour's manifesto policies, Mr Griffiths concluded, that they had rallied behind Boris Johnson even though he had departed from the majority ruling class position of maintaining EU membership. This explained the ferocious media campaign against Jeremy Corbyn, abetted by treacherous anti-socialist and fanatically pro-EU Labour MPs.

The Communist Party does not engage in politics in Northern Ireland and encourages communists there to join the Communist Party of Ireland. When members move abroad, they are encouraged to join the communist party of the country in which they reside.

6. International Activities

Since 1999, communist and workers' parties from across the world have met each year to exchange news and views, hold bilateral discussions and endorse statements setting out common positions on particular issues. In 2019 meeting was held in Izmir, Turkey. Information on this meeting and on the international communist and workers party movement in general may found at www.solidnet.org.

Priority was again given to solidarity work with the peoples of Palestine, Cuba and Venezuela, to campaigning to oppose further foreign adventures, whether in the Middle East or elsewhere, and to opposing proscriptions against communist parties anywhere in the world including the European Union and Ukraine.

At home the Communist Party of Britain participates in the work of the Co-ordinating Committee of Communist Parties.
