Political Report 2013

Throughout 2013 Sinn Féin continued to lead by example in the Executive in the north and as the main opposition party in the south. We worked to advance the peace process, continued to prioritise investment in job creation and set out real alternatives to the policies of austerity from Fianna Fáil, Fine Gael, the Labour Party and the Tories in London.

Delivering for the people

Throughout the year we led opposition to the implementation of Tory Welfare Cuts and promoted job creation, supporting the work of our Ministerial team.

We demanded the transfer of Fiscal powers to the Assembly and campaigned for important infrastructural investments such as the A5, the construction of the Narrow Water Bridge and the Programme for Government commitment for a Peace and Reconciliation Centre at Maze/Long Kesh. We brought forward proposals to the Assembly for recognition of LGBT Rights including Equal Marriage.

In Belfast we launched proposals for an anti-Poverty Task Force and Forum and in the South we launched proposals to repeal the Property Tax.

We launched 'Towards a New Republic' – wide ranging proposals for political reform on the island.

Our sitting MEP Martina Anderson took a lead role in ensuring the passage of a new Tobacco Products Directive, action on Domestic Violence and was the only local MEP to oppose savage cuts in the EU Budget. Throughout the year she hosted a range of delegations in Brussels on Justice, Equality and Rural development issues.

We published our alternative budget "A Fair Budget" which included a range of proposals on an all-Ireland economy. In the Assembly in September we brought forward a motion calling for an inquiry into the abuse and exploitation of children both in care homes and elsewhere.

Peace and Reconciliation

Throughout the year we expressed our concern at the growing disengagement of both the British and Irish governments from the peace process and we continued to push them to deliver on their commitments on outstanding aspects of the Good Friday Agreement and subsequent agreements including Acht na Gaelige, Bill of Rights and Equality issues. We stood alongside communities being attacked under the guise of "Flag Protests" and were vocal in urging the PSNI to do their job in dealing with widespread criminality and illegal blocking of roads. We were active in calling for the release of a number of prisoners being wrongfully held and denied due process. We opposed Jim Allister's Special Advisors Bill which was little more than a legislative process for discrimination.

The party continued to promote reconciliation and invested significant time and resources to the issue. Throughout the year the party newspaper An Phoblacht carried a series of articles from unionist voices. In June we hosted a special conference in Belfast entitled "A City of Equals" which saw contributions from a range of unionist voices and church opinion. In September Martin McGuinness travelled to Warrington at the invitation of Colin Parry to give a keynote address, which received significant media attention.

Throughout the second half of 2013 the party played a full and constructive role in the Haass Talks. In November we published detailed proposals on the three areas under consideration – Dealing with the Past, Parades and Flags and Emblems. We participated in the talks throughout December and welcomed the Haass proposals published on 31st December.

Irish unity and All-Ireland politics

The party was represented by our TDs, MLAs and MPs throughout the year at the Constitutional Convention in Dublin and in September the Convention overwhelmingly voted in favour of extending Presidential voting rights to Irish Citizens outside the 26 Counties. Our MPs played a full role in the Good Friday Agreement Committee in the Oireachtas.

We continued to build support for a Border Poll, starting with a party conference in Dublin in January. This was followed by "United Ireland – You Decide" referendums in South Armagh/North Louth in May and in West Tyrone/East Donegal in November. Significant debates on the theme of "Uniting Ireland" were also held in Dublin, Crossmaglen, Armagh,London and and Brussels.

Setting the agenda

In February we launched our Mid-Ulster Election campaign with Francie Molloy winning the byelection the following month and being replaced in the Assembly by Ian Milne. This was followed by a by-election in Meath East in March where Darren O'Rourke represented the party. In September we launched "Yes" campaigns for both the Seanad and Appeal Court Referenda in the south. We also held four selection conventions to choose our EU candidates in every Irish constituency and began selecting our candidates for the 2014 Local Government elections. We agreed national targets to stand a minimum of 30% female candidates in the Local and European elections.

We continued to grow our membership, increasing it by 25% in 2013, with a particular focus on female membership.

In March Belfast hosted our National Youth Congress and the Slógadh, our annual Irish Language event.

In April one of our biggest Ard Fheis ever was held in Castlebar, County Mayo.

In June our annual Summer School took place in Baile Mhuirne in West Cork and included a ranged of speakers including Eamon Dunphy, Basil McCrea, Roy Greenslade and Seán Óg Ó hAilpín. It was also addressed by disability campaigner Joanne O'Riordan, who spoke about cherishing all of the children of the nation equally. In June, Sinn Fein MEP Martina Anderson hosted a conference in Cavan on the issues of youth unemployment in Ireland and the EU's 'Youth Guarantee' proposals.

The National Hunger Strike Commemoration event took place in Monaghan in August 2013. In September we were once again represented at the National Ploughing Championships in County Laois, where we launched our "Stand Up for Rural Ireland" policy platform. In September and October we held our Oireachtas and Assembly "Away-Days".

In October a delegation of senior Trade Union leaders from the United States visited Ireland under the banner of "In Common Cause" and participated in events in Dublin, Belfast and Waterford. They also spoke at a rally in the Mansion House in Dublin, alongside Trade Union leaders from Ireland and Sinn Fein representatives. 2013 also marked the centenary of a number of significant historic events and the party marked the formation of the Irish Volunteers with an event in Dublin in November and a series of events throughout the year to mark the100th anniversary of the 1913 Lockout. These included a conference entitled "A Century of Workers Struggle" in March and the James Connolly Summer School in Dublin in May.

In December party President Gerry Adams represented Sinn Féin at the funeral of former South African President Nelson Mandela.

Statement of Treasurer's responsibilities

- presume that the party will continue in business.

Section 41 of the Act requires that the Treasurer is responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at anytime the financial position of the party at that time and to enable her to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Act. She is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the party and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Auditing Standard issued by the Auditing Practices Board. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the Treasurer in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Party's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.
