#### Introduction

The SDLP continues to work around the underpinning values established by the founders of the Party. These are to the fore in our decision making and are fundamental to the trusteeship and governance that Conference elected the Executive and Party Officers to preserve and pass on. In essence the values set by the Constitution have been the guide throughout the year.

The recession continues to bite and the weakest in society are feeling the pain of the North's peripheral location, our transitional economy and the deeply negative impact of failure to address the historical issues and fault lines that haunt us.

The SDLP entered the Stormont House talks with a positive attitude and a will to resolve outstanding issues. There were four main issues for debate at the Talks, finance including welfare reform, issues from the Haass Talks, Institutions and function and unfinished Good Friday Agreement business: including North South, Civic Forum and the Irish Language Bill. The SDLP recognised that there were strengths and weaknesses in the outcomes of the Talks and said we would work to build what was strong and to make better those elements that are weak.

#### Elections

The Party's candidate for the European Election, Alex Attwood, was in campaign mode from the moment that he was selected at Party Conference. Every constituency was visited on numerous occasions and provided great support to our Local Government candidates. He visited schools, businesses, community groups, hospitals, markets, town centres as well as door-to-door canvassing. It was disappointing that the party did not take a seat in the European Parliament but we will keep our contact with Europe through our membership of the Party of European Socialists.

The party ran 119 candidates in 68 DEAs in the 11 Super councils and we had 66 candidates elected across all 11 super councils. This gives the party a base in local government which is undergoing a great deal of change through the reform of local government. The challenge is enormous but we have strong people in place who are up to the challenge.

In readiness for the election campaign a number of training events were held and our candidates and workers were given advice on rules and regulations governing elections, campaign planning and media training.

The Electoral Commission in conjunction with the Electoral Office and Royal Mail also put on a series of information seminars across the North for Local Government and European candidates which were very informative.

With Westminster elections scheduled for 7 May 2015. The party also started the process of identifying candidates to run in all 18 constituencies in the North. This required all potential candidates to complete an application form and attend for interview before proceeding to a selection convention.

#### **Conferences/seminars**

The party held four very successful conference this year.

#### Securing Ireland's Farming future

The agriculture conference has become an annual event in our calendar and we were pleased once again to have, Irish Agriculture Minister, Simon Coveney, as our Key Speaker at the conference which was held on the 10 April in Omagh.. The conference covered three main themes: Current Farming Issues, the Agri-sector Processing and Marketing and the European dimension for Irish agriculture.

In May the Party took a stand at the Balmoral Show and we were well represented at the show by our MLAs/MPs, Councillors and Executive members. Agriculture is one of the most important sectors of our economy and it is imperative that the NI Executive works closely with our Southern counterparts to accelerate the agri food sector on the island in line with the Harvest 2020 Strategy.

#### **Dealing with the Past Lecture**

A seminar on issues and mechanisms for dealing with the past was organised with a range of guest speakers and an invited audience of key stakeholders and practitioners in the fields of law reform, human rights and legacy inquests. The evening also included 'The Gerry Conlon Memorial Lecture, a keynote lecture from international human rights expert Michael Manseragh. This seminar was held in St Mary's College on Friday the 23<sup>rd</sup> of January.

#### Care for our Future – Looking after our Older People

The health conference took place on Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> March in Belfast. The focus of this conference was to discuss the provision of service, particularly towards our older people. The SDLP want to ensure that this provision has quality and care at its core, and also has a pragmatic outcome that keeps people well cared for in their homes.

Expert speakers were invited to address different areas of the subject, took questions on their areas of expertise and this was followed by a discussion session.

#### **City Deals Conference**

The 'City Deal for Derry' breakfast seminar was held in the City Hotel on Friday 13<sup>th</sup> March. A 'City Deal' is a UK-wide government initiative which aims to help a city or region boost investment, promote growth and create thousands of jobs.

Councillor Nick Small from Liverpool City Council explained the value of City Deals which devolves different combinations of assets, capacity, intervention powers and investments.

#### **Party Conferences**

Party representatives attended the Fine Gael, Fianna Fail and the Labour Party conferences. The Party Leader, Alasdair McDonnell attended the British Labour Party Conference and we hosted a joint reception with the Irish Labour Party and the British Labour Party on Social Democracy and Progressive Politics.

#### Policy

The Policy Committee works with the policy unit to keep the wider membership of the party involved in policy development. The economy, health, agriculture and education, welfare reform and housing are identified as issues which must be monitored continually and developed.

#### **Election Manifesto**

The Policy Unit with spokespersons, steered by the Election Directorate, drafted a manifesto which highlighted the core policy objectives of SDLP at both European Union and Local Government levels. In the course of this work the policy officers engaged with a wide range of key stakeholders to provide the essential views and a sound basis for policies which were then integrated into the manifesto.

Work has also commenced on the manifesto for the Westminster election in 2015.

#### International

The party had a busy year regarding international matters with the largest single event undoubtedly being the elections for the European Parliament. Our candidate Alex Attwood ran an excellent campaign to join our Party of European Socialists (PES) colleagues in the European Parliament and in terms of first preferences finished only 0.3% behind the final MEP elected.

International support for the SDLP was demonstrated by the visit to Belfast of Martin Schulz, PES's candidate for the position of the Presidency of the European Commission. Martin Schulz had been chosen for this position by an open common candidate process and had secured the support of the SDLP.

An SDLP delegation had endorsed Martin Schulz by travelling to the PES Congress in Rome in February of this year. The congress in Rome also heard a message from Alex Attwood MLA which reaffirmed our commitment to an integrated Europe based on social justice and inclusion.

A group of SDLP members travelled to Scotland to observe the final stages of the Scottish Independence referendum. As well as meeting with YES and NO campaigners and visiting the Scottish Parliament, they took the opportunity to meet with campaigners and study and learn from the campaign techniques employed by both the Yes and No campaigns. Alasdair McDonnell travelled to Washington for the St Patrick's Day Celebrations. He had a packed programme which included meeting the undocumented lobby, the State Department, special advisors to Senator Kerry, Bob Casey's Chief of Staff, Chief Executives from the AFLCIO and Irish Embassy representatives. He also met with the President and Senator Joe Biden.

#### **Electoral Commission**

The party continues to receive funding from the Electoral Commission in respect of policy development. This funding allows the party to employ policy staff and to develop party policy.

For the year April 2014 to March 2015 we were allocated £151,000. As is practice, we were paid 75% upfront and the other 25% is paid after the Electoral Commission carry out an audit and is satisfied that the funds have been used for policy development. This audit will not take place until May/June 2015.

The Electoral Commission hosts meetings with the main five parties in the Assembly on a quarterly basis and the Party is represented at these by the General Secretary.

#### Report of the Party Officers for the year ended 31 December 2014

#### **Financial Review**

The accounts indicate a profit of £21,798 as a result of total income received during the year of £440,344 being in excess of expenditure incurred during the year of £418,546.

Income rose by £79,861 as compared to the 2013 calendar year. The prime reason behind this being due to the increase in donations received from individuals and companies during the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2014.

Expenditure incurred during the year has at the same time increased. However overall running costs were reduced from £317,607 in 2013 to £238,344 in 2014. We did however have the added expenses of the Local Government and European Elections.

The Policy Development Grant from the Electoral Commission remains a valuable source of income and has allowed us to enhance our performance in the development of party policy.

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Report and financial statements

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#### Year ended 31 December 2014

#### **Responsibilities of the Management Committee**

The Management Committee of the SDLP is required by the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the SDLP and of its surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Management Committee is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;

- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the party will continue in business.

Section 41 of the Act requires that the Management Committee are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the SDLP and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Act. The Management Committee are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the party and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

# Report of the Auditors to the Management Committee of the Social Democratic & Labour Party ('SDLP')

We have audited the financial statements of the Social Democratic and Labour Party for the year ended 31 December 2014 on pages 4 to 11 which have been prepared under the accounting policies set out on page 7.

Save as above, we do not accept responsibility for this report to any other person or for any other purpose and we hereby expressly disclaim any and all such liability.

#### Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the Management Committee in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the party's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

#### Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2014

#### 1. Accounting policies

#### 1.1. Basis of preparation

The SDLP is not incorporated in law and is not bound by the Companies (Northern Ireland) Order 1986. The SDLP is required to prepare financial statements in accordance with the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 ('PPERA'). Accordingly, the financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and are in accordance with the applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Accounts Guidance Notes issued by the Electoral Commission.

The SDLP relies on donation income to meet a large proportion of its expenditure, including most of its non-recurring expenditure. Donation income is inherently unpredictable, but the Management Committee is hopeful that sufficient donations will be received to meet the needs of the SDLP.

Against this background, the Management Committee has reviewed the projected budgets for the SDLP for 2014 and is hopeful that sufficient donation income and other funding will be generated for it to meet its financial obligations and remain within its overdraft facility. On this basis, the Management Committee considers that it is appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

#### 1.2. Income recognition

Donations and constituency income are recognised when received in the form of cash. Membership levies and affiliation fees are included when received. The SDLP does not have any trading activity. However, certain services are provided to elected representatives and these are charged at cost. Invoiced services are recognised within fund-raising income when the service is provided. Amounts receivable at the year end are recorded as trade debtors. Work carried out by the SDLP by volunteers who provide their own time free of charge is not treated as a donation-in-kind.

#### 1.3. Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised in the period in which it is incurred and amounts payable at the year end is recorded as trade creditors.

#### **1.4.** Tangible fixed assets

Properties are stated at cost or at valuation, where appropriate. Other tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated to write down the cost of these assets concerned, generally over 4 years for computers and 5 years for other office furniture and equipment. Depreciation is normally charged on a straight-line basis.

#### 1.5. Leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the income and expenditure account when incurred. Assets are not acquired under finance leases.
