#### **Responsibilities of the Management Committee**

The Management Committee of the SDLP is required by the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the SDLP and of its surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Management Committee is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;

- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the party will continue in business.

Section 41 of the Act requires that the Management Committee are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the SDLP and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Act. The Management Committee are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the party and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

## Report of the Auditors to the Management Committee of the Social Democratic & Labour Party ('SDLP')

We have audited the financial statements of the Social Democratic and Labour Party for the year ended 31 December 2016 on pages 4 to 11 which have been prepared under the accounting policies set out on page 7.

## Respective responsibilities of Management Committee and auditors

The responsibilities of the Management Committee for preparing the annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards are set out in the Statement of Management Committee's Responsibilities on page 1.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and United Kingdom Auditing Standards.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 7. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Management Committee's Financial Review is not consistent with the financial statements, if the party has not kept proper accounting records or if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit.

We have read the Report of the Party Officers and have considered whether it is consistent with the audited financial statements. We have considered the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements or material inconsistencies within the financial statements. Our responsibilities do not extend to any other information.

No person is entitled to rely upon this report by virtue of and for the purpose of the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 or has been expressly authorised to do so by our prior written consent. Save as above, we do not accept responsibility for this report to any other person or for any other purpose and we hereby expressly disclaim any and all such liability.

#### Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the Management Committee in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the party's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

### Opinion

## Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2016

## 1. Accounting policies

## 1.1. Basis of preparation

The SDLP is not incorporated in law and is not bound by the Companies (Northern Ireland) Order 1986. The SDLP is required to prepare financial statements in accordance with the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 ('PPERA'). Accordingly, the financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and are in accordance with the applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Accounts Guidance Notes issued by the Electoral Commission.

The SDLP relies on donation income to meet a large proportion of its expenditure, including most of its non-recurring expenditure. Donation income is inherently unpredictable, but the Management Committee is hopeful that sufficient donations will be received to meet the needs of the SDLP.

Against this background, the Management Committee has reviewed the projected budgets for the SDLP for 2017 and is hopeful that sufficient donation income and other funding will be generated for it to meet its financial obligations and remain within its overdraft facility. On this basis, the Management Committee considers that it is appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

#### **1.2.** Income recognition

Donations and constituency income are recognised when received in the form of cash. Membership levies and affiliation fees are included when received. The SDLP does not have any trading activity. However, certain services are provided to elected representatives and these are charged at cost. Invoiced services are recognised within fund-raising income when the service is provided. Amounts receivable at the year end are recorded as trade debtors. Work carried out by the SDLP by volunteers who provide their own time free of charge is not treated as a donation-in-kind.

## 1.3. Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised in the period in which it is incurred and amounts payable at the year end is recorded as trade creditors.

## 1.4. Tangible fixed assets

Properties are stated at cost or at valuation, where appropriate. Other tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated to write down the cost of these assets concerned, generally over 4 years for computers and 5 years for other office furniture and equipment. Depreciation is normally charged on a straight-line basis.

### 1.5. Leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the income and expenditure account when incurred. Assets are not acquired under finance leases.

## Introduction

To say 2016 was an eventful year is an understatement.

We had the "Fresh Start" rolled out at the beginning of the year. At the outset the SDLP said it was profoundly flawed as it did not include comprehensive proposals on the Past, firm proposals to tackle criminality and paramilitarism and limited proposals on economic regeneration. It also returned power to the Conservatives to legislate for Northern Ireland on welfare including benefit freezes which gave rise to serious concerns.

We forecast that we would be back round the negotiating table. This is exactly the position in which we find ourselves.

The SDLP recognises that there are many challenges ahead but we are committed to making our vision of a *reconciled people living in a united, just and prosperous New Ireland* a reality.

### Elections

The Northern Ireland elections were scheduled for May 2016. We ran 25 candidates across the 18 constituencies. We would like to place on record our thanks to all our candidates.

In the run up to the elections three of our sitting MLAs, John Dallat, Alban Maginness and Dominic Bradley indicated that they would not be seeking a nomination. John, Alban and Dominic were long serving members of the Assembly and we would like to thank them for the tremendous contribution they made to the SDLP and to Northern Ireland.

Unfortunately we lost Fearghal McKinney in South Belfast, Gerard Diver in Foyle, Dolores Kelly in Upper Bann and Sean Rogers in South Down. However, Richie McPhillips won a seat for the Party in Fermanagh South Tyrone and we came back with a total of 12 MLAs.

The election of Gerry Mullan in East Derry, Richie McPhillips in Fermanagh South Tyrone, Nichola Mallon in North Belfast and Colin McGrath in South Down created a number of council vacancies and these were filled by John Deighan, Garbhan McPhillips, Paul McCusker and John Trainor.

### Northern Ireland Assembly Manifesto

The Policy Unit with spokespersons, steered by the Election Directorate and members of the Policy Committee, drafted a manifesto which highlighted the core policy objectives of SDLP in the Northern Ireland Assembly. In the course of this work members of the Policy Unit engaged with a wide range of key stakeholders to provide the essential views and a sound basis for policies which were then integrated into the manifesto. Short briefings on policy topics were also provided for canvassers.

## Opposition

Following the May election, talks began on the formation of the Northern Ireland Executive. The SDLP went in with firm proposals to the Talks. However it was evident that papers provided by the DUP and Sinn Fein lacked detail and were regarded by the SDLP as warm words with generalities. It was also clear that the DUP and Sinn Fein were not willing to commit to an inclusive powersharing Executive-it was to be government on their terms not agreed terms.

A special meeting of the SDLP Assembly Parliamentary Group and the Party's Executive was held and it was unanimously agreed that the SDLP could not go into the Executive but would go into opposition. It transpired that the life of the Assembly was short lived but the concept and practice of opposition began to create an impact, calling government to account for its actions and more often its inactions.

## Brexit

The 23<sup>rd</sup> June was set as the date for a referendum on Brexit and the SDLP registered with the Electoral Commission to campaign to remain in Europe.

In the run up to the referendum the party held a series of meetings across the Northern Ireland as well as in Ireland and in the UK. Alasdair McDonnell MP took a lead role outlining the advantages of remaining within the EU. The Party Leader and other members of the Party also met with leaders of political parties in the European Union.

The vote to leave the EU came as a great shock to many. There are more questions than answers about the effect Brexit will have on Northern Ireland not least the potential of a hard border between North and South and what that will mean to us politically, economically and socially. The SDLP is working for special status for Northern Ireland within Europe and will work with other Pro-European Parties in Ireland and the UK to secure that status.

### **Parliamentary Assembly**

The Party's Assembly Parliamentary Group includes Assembly MLAs and Westminster MPs and is chaired by Alex Attwood, MLA.

At Westminster, Margaret Ritchie serves on the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs Committee and is co-chair of the Visitors' Economy Group, Mark Durkan serves on the Parliamentary Human Rights Group and the Brexit Committee and Alasdair McDonnell serves on the Northern Ireland Affairs Committee.

## Political issues

During 2016 issues such as NAMA, the Social Investment Fund, Abortion, Equal Marriage, the Irish Language Act and the Renewable Heating Incentive came to the fore.

The SDLP recognised that, for all the better projects coming through the Social Investment Fund, it was crucial to ask the hard questions as to how projects were being managed, how some were ever funded and what the outcomes were for the community as a whole not just individuals within the community.

The Justice Bill presented to the Assembly had two amendments added to it dealing with issues around abortion. The SDLP received expert advice that the proposals raised more questions and uncertainties and opposed the amendments.

Marriage equality was brought before the Assembly and the SDLP, as party policy, supported the introduction of marriage equality to Northern Ireland. Once again this motion was defeated with the DUP voting against. The SDLP became the co-sponsors of a Private Members Equal Marriage Bill which fell with the subsequent collapse of the Assembly.

On the Irish Language Act, the SDLP remains committed to the introduction of an Act. In addition the SDLP tabled a proposal for a Private Members Bill and was in the process of drafting legislation when political events intervened.

The Renewable Heating Incentive Scheme gave rise to serious concerns with regard to how it was being managed and the cost to the taxpayers over a prolonged period of time.

The SDLP put forward a motion to the Northern Ireland Assembly asking the First Minister to step aside to allow an inquiry to proceed on the RHI Scheme. The First Minister remained steadfast in her refusal to step aside and subject herself to full scrutiny and accountability. This was followed by the resignation of the Deputy First Minister which resulted in the collapse of the Northern Ireland Assembly and the calling of an election in March 2017.

## Conferences

The SDLP has had representatives at political parties' conferences in Ireland, in Britain and in Europe, with a series of meetings being held with the PES. The YES hosted a conference in Belfast at which members of SDLP Youth participated.

In October 2016, the Party Leader, Colum Eastwood addressed the Ulster Unionist Party Conference at which he received a warm reception. He outlined how we would work in opposition on issues where we had common ground recognising the there are issues on which we fundamentally disagreed.

## **SDLP Conferences**

The Party held a number of conferences throughout 2016.

At the beginning of the year we held a seminar on welfare reform which was targeted to councillors and constituency staff.

A health conference was held on 22 January 2016 entitled 'How Can we Fix our Health Service'. Guest speakers were Janice Smyth, RCN, Adrian Norton, HCIL, Dr Tom Black, NIGPC, Kevin McAdam, Unite, Matthias Beck, QUB and John Compton, former CEO of NIHSCB. Stakeholders in the health professions were invited and the conference focused on the needs of a growing older population.

The Party brought forward to March 2016 the Party Conference which was held in Derry. This was a very different conference from what we normally hold. Instead of the usual motions to conference we held a series of policy sessions with guest speakers. Issues discussed were: Tackling Crime, Building Safer Communities, The EU- Central to our Economic Future, Delivering Better Government for All and a Health Service that Delivers for all.

Following the EU referendum the Party held a conference in Belfast on 6 July to discuss the effects of Brexit on Northern Ireland. Guest speakers included, John McGrane, Director General, British Irish Chamber of Commerce; David Phinnemore, Dean of Education at the School of Politics, International Studies and Philosophy, Queen's University Belfast and Stephen Gethins MP SNP Europe Spokesperson.

On 17 September 2016 the Party held a meeting of the Party's Central Council to update the membership on political developments. This was followed by a constitutional conference on 13 October when the party presented a new party structure which was duly endorsed by the party members.

### **Electoral Commission**

The party continues to receive funding from the Electoral Commission in respect of policy development. This funding allows the party to employ policy staff and to develop party policy.

For the year April 2016 to March 2017 we were allocated £134,000. As is practice, we were paid 75% upfront and the other 25% is paid after the Electoral Commission carry out an audit and is satisfied that the funds have been used for policy development. This audit will take place until June 2017.

### Report of the Party Officers for the year ended 31 December 2016

## **Financial Review**

The accounts indicate a loss of £59,640 as a result of total expenditure incurred during the year of £378,808 being in excess of total income received during the year of £319,168.

Income fell by £224,536 as compared to the 2015 calendar year. The prime reason behind this being due to a reduction in donations and fund raising.

Expenditure incurred during the year has at the same time decreased by £222,043. This is due to the substantial decrease in running costs. Every effort must be made in the coming year to increase income and reduce expenditure.

The Policy Development Grant from the Electoral Commission remains a valuable source of income and has allowed us to enhance our performance in the development of party policy.
