The Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) Report of the Party Officers for the year ended 31 December 2016

The Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) is a federation constituted by the Scottish Liberal Democrats, the Welsh Liberal Democrats (Democratiald Rhyddfrydol Cymru) and the Liberal Democrats in England (together, the State Parties). The Liberal Democrats in England is a federation of the Regional Parties in England. The Regional Partles comprise a number of Local Partles.

The Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) is constituted under section 26 of the Polltical Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 as a central organisation with 454 accounting units.

These financial statements deal solely with the activities of the Federal Party as set out in Article 2 of the Constitution of the Federal Party. They do not include the income, expenditure, assets or liabilities of the State, Regional, Local Parties, or any other bodies.

1. Administrative information

Committees

The following committees operate within The Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) ("the Federal Party", "the Party") to oversee and manage the organisation's business. The terms of reference for each committee are contained within the Party's constitution. The Chairs of the respective committees are:

Conference is the sovereign representative body of the Party with the power to determine its policies. In addition to setting the Party's policies, Conference also receives reports from the federal committees and parliamentary and European parliamentary parties. Membership of Conference is defined by article 6.1 of the constitution.

Conference is organised by the Federal Conference Committee (FCC), membership of which is defined by article 8.7 of the constitution.

Between conferences the Federal Policy Committee (FPC) is responsible for researching, developing and overseeing the policy making process. Membership of the FPC is defined by article 7.2 of the constitution.

The Federal Executive (FE) is responsible for directing, co-ordinating and implementing the work of the Federal Party. Membership of the FE is defined by article 8.1 of the constitution.

The Federal Finance & Resources Committee (FFRC) is a sub-committee of the FE responsible for the planning and administration of the budget and finances of the Federal Party, directing the administration of the Federal Party and ensuring compliance of the Party at all levels with the provisions of the Political Parties, Elections

and Referendums Act 2000 as amended by the Political Parties and Election Act 2009 and by the Electoral Administration Act 2006. The FFRC is also responsible for the appointment of the Federal Party's auditor and ensuring that there are adequate financial controls and systems in place. Membership of the FFRC is defined by article 8.2 of the constitution.

The Campaigns & Communications Committee (CCC) exists to co-ordinate the Party's national campaigns and communications strategy. Membership consists of a Chair elected biannually by the FE, the Party President, Party Leader, Chief Whip and two members directly elected by the FE.

The International Relations Committee (IRC) is responsible for the Party's international lialson. Its membership consists of representatives of the state and parliamentary parties, Liberal Youth, Liberal International British Group, European Liberal Democrats and Reform Group and individuals elected by Conference representatives.

The Federal Audit and Scrutiny Committee (FASC) are appointed by the Federal Board. The FASC's responsibilities include; meeting with the auditor and receiving its reports, ensuring compliance with the Party's external regulatory bodies, compliance with any statutory or regulatory provisions related to the Party's activities, and legal compliance with the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 as amended by the Political Parties and Elections Act 2009 and the Electoral Administration Act 2009.

In addition there are 102 Liberal Democrat members of the House of Lords, five Liberal Democrat members of the Scottish Parliament, one Liberal Democrat member of the Weish Assembly and one Liberal Democrat member of the Greater London Authority. As of December 2016 there were approximately 1,820 Liberal Democrat Councillors. There are also two directly elected Liberal Democrat Mayors.

The Party has 454 accounting units registered with the Electoral Commission.

2. Review of political activities

2016 was dominated by the UK's decision to leave the European Union. The referendum campaign was a key campaigning focus for the first six months of the year, galvanising the party after the disappointment of the 2015 General Election. Although the result of the referendum was deeply disappointing, the party's unapologetically pro-EU stance helped us to capitalise on the disappointment felt by a significant portion of the population that voted to remain in the EU. The Brexit vote led to our second membership surge in the space of a year, taking our membership to over 80,000, marking an almost doubling of our membership since the 2015 General Election.

The party's electoral fortunes have also taken a turn for the better. We achieved a positive result in the Witney Parliamentary by-election in October, recording a 23% increase in our vote share; before winning the Richmond Park by-election in December, increasing our number of MP's to nine. This success has been matched by clear progress in local authority by-elections, where we gained more councillors than any other party.

Due to cost pressures, Autumn Conference in Brighton was a four-day event in 2016, instead of the usual five days. The conference was well-attended, in particular by new members. The Federal Conference committee have agreed that the 2017 Autumn Conference will be a four-day event too, although this does not necessarily set a precedent that all future Autumn Conferences will be of this length.

2016 was a year of rejuvenation for the Liberal Democrats after a difficult 2015. Increases in our representation at both the local and national level, and in our party membership, give us an excellent springboard for the future.

Conferences

The Party held two conferences during the year:

- Spring
- Autumn

Spring

The 2016 Spring Conference was held in York with debates covering fracking, privacy & security and private renting.

Autumn

The 2016 Autumn Conference was held in Brighton with debates on homelessness, social security and Britain's place in the European Union.

Policy development

The party continued to develop new policies throughout 2016 with working groups looking at a range of issues including nuclear weapons and sex work, with both policies due to be debated at conference in 2017.

3. Financial Review

The Party's finances improved markedly in 2016 compared to 2015. Fundraising income from both digital and major fundraising sources achieved tough targets and some cost savings also helped in achieving a significant surplus.

Conference income has remained a challenge and public funds receipts -Policy Development Grant funding - are still lower than they were during the period before we entered government but adjustments have been made to ensure that the Party operates within its means.

A further large increase in membership following the EU Referendum was, as with 2015, primarily to the financial benefit of the local parties rather than the Federal Party but the increased membership base has provided the Party with a larger pool of potential donors for both regular and specific appeals (e.g. for parliamentary By-Elections campaigns)

The Federal Party recorded a surplus in the year of £854,828 which reduced our net liabilities at the year end to £43,310. Of this surplus, £802,309 related to the General Fund and £52,519 related to the Legacy Fund that was launched in 2013.

Peter Dunphy Registered Treasurer 29 June 2017 The Registered Treasurer of the Party is required by the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Party and of its surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Registered Treasurer is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- · make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Party will continue in business.

Section 41 of the Act requires that the Registered Treasurer is responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Party at that time and to enable him to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Act.

Section 43 of the Act requires that the Registered Treasurer is responsible for delivery of the statement of accounts to the Electoral Commission by the required deadline.

The Registered Treasurer is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Party and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Registered Treasurer has taken all steps he ought to have taken to make himself aware of any information required by the auditor for the purpose of their audit and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information. The Registered Treasurer is not aware of any relevant information of which the auditor is unaware.

Independent Auditor's Report to The Federal Conference of The Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party)

We have audited the financial statements of the Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) for the year ended 31 December 2016 which comprise the Income and Expenditure Account, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and related notes. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and the Statement of Accounts Guidance Notes issued by the Electoral Commission.

Respective responsibilities of the Registered Treasurer and auditor

As explained more fully in the Statement of Registered Treasurer's Responsibilities set out on page 7, the Registered Treasurer is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view.

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors. This report is made solely to the Federal Conference of the Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party), as a body, in accordance with section 43 of the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the Federal Conference of the Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Federal Conference of the Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Scope of the audit of the financial statements

An audit involves obtaining evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements sufficient to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or error. This includes an assessment of: whether the accounting policies are appropriate to The Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) circumstances and have been consistently applied and adequately disclosed; the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the Registered Treasurer; and the overall presentation of the financial statements.

In addition, we read all the financial and non-financial information in the Report of the Party Officers to identify material inconsistencies with the audited financial statements and to identify any information that is apparently materially incorrect based on, or materially inconsistent with, the knowledge acquired by us in the course of performing the audit. If we become aware of any apparent material misstatements or inconsistencies we consider the implications for our report.

Opinion on the financial statements

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) as at 31 December 2016 and of its surplus for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with relevant legislation and the Statement of Accounts Guidance Notes issued by the Electoral Commission; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000.

1 Accounting policies

The Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) is a federation constituted by the Scottish Liberal Democrats, the Weish Liberal Democrats (Democratiaid Rhyddfrydol Cymru) and the Liberal Democrats in England (together, the State Parties). The Liberal Democrats in England is a federation of the Regional Parties in England. The Regional Parties comprise a number of Local Parties.

The Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) is constituted under section 26 of the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 as a central organisation with 454 accounting units. Details of these units are available from party headquarters.

These financial statements deal solely with the activities of the Federal Party as set out in Article 2 of the Constitution of the Federal Party. They do not include the income, expenditure, assets or liabilities of the State, Regional, Local Parties, or any other bodies.

Basis of preparation

The Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) is not incorporated in law and is thus not bound by the Companies Act 2006. The Party is required to prepare financial statements in accordance with the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 ("PPERA"). The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with applicable law and the statement of Accounts Guidance Notes issued by Electoral Commission.

Going concern

The Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) shares a banking facility with certain other Liberal Democrat entitles, and there is a right of set off belween bank accounts of those entities. The Registered Treasurer has therefore considered the applicability of the going concern basis of preparation of the financial statements by reference to the aggregated financial position of those entities.

The Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) relies on the receipt of donation income to meet a significant proportion of its expenditure, and an overdraft facility with its banker to meet working capital requirements. Donation income is inherently unpredictable, but the Registered Treasurer is confident that sufficient donations will be received and facilities will continue to be available to allow the entity to meet its financial obligations.

The Registered Treasurer has reviewed the aggregated cash flow projections for the entities to the end of June 2018. On the basis of these projections the Registered Treasurer Is satisfied that Liberal Democrats (The Federal Party) will be able to meet its financial obligations as they fall due, and that it is therefore appropriate to prepare the financial statement on a going concern basis.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

Income recognition

Income is recognised when all of the following conditions have been met:

- The Party Is entitled to the asset;
- There is reasonable certainty that the asset will be received; and
- The value of the asset can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Applying these criteria to specific types of income results in the following treatment:

- Donations of monetary assets and liquid investments are recognised in the income and Expenditure account on receipt. Donations of notional income are recognised on receipt at the relevant market value of the item or service received with an expense of the same amount being recognised contemporaneously.
- Grants are recognised in the Income and Expenditure account when the conditions for receipt of the grant have been met.
- Membership and subscription fees are recognised on a receipts basis.
- Legacles are recognised when the personal representatives of the deceased have notified the Party of the legacy, they have obtained grant of representation and there are no significant matters outstanding concerning the precise division of the estate. Legacles notified to the Party after 1 August 2013 are included in a separate Legacy Fund.
- Newspaper and conference income, and the State Party Levy are recognised on an accruals basis.
- Interest receivable is recognised in the Income and Expenditure account on an accruals basis.

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided to write off the cost, less estimated residual values, of all fixed assets evenly over their expected useful lives. It is calculated at the following rates:

Campaign expenditure

The Party does not provide a breakdown of campaign expenditure between campaigns as the officers believe such an analysis would not be possible, given the continuous expenses incurred on multiple campaigns.

Recharged expenditure

The Federal Party meets the majority of the overheads incurred by the English State Party and some of those incurred by the Parliamentary Office of the Liberal Democrats and the Scottish and Welsh State Parties. These costs are recovered through the Federal Party recharge.

Leased assets

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

Pension benefit

Defined benefit pension scheme:

The Party formerly sponsored the Liberal Headquarters 1975 Retirement Fund. As at the year end the scheme was in surplus and had only one deferred member and no active members. In January 2014 the scheme purchased a deferred annuity for the one remaining member and in June 2014 the Party commenced the winding up of the scheme. It is anticipated that the wind up of the scheme will be completed by the end of 2017.

The amounts involved are not reflected in the accounts as they are not material.

Defined contribution scheme:

Contributions to the Party's defined contribution pension scheme are charged to the income and Expenditure account in the year in which they become payable.

Tax

As a voluntary society, tax is only charged on investment income.

25 Pensions

The Party formerly sponsored the Liberal Headquarters 1975 Retirement Fund. As at the year end the scheme was in surplus and had only one deferred member and no active members. In January 2014 the scheme purchased a deferred annuity for the one remaining member and in June 2014 the Party commenced the winding up of the scheme. It is anticipated that the wind up of the scheme will be completed by the end of 2017.

Once the scheme is wound up any remaining surplus will be returned to the Party and treated as a return of the additional contributions made.

Other post-retirement benefit schemes

The Federal Party contributes to personal pension schemes held in the names of individual employees. The assets of these schemes are held separately from those of the Federal Party in independently administered funds. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable to these funds and amounted to £179,427 (2015: £198,885). At 31 December 2016, contributions amounting to £19,843 (2015: £23,346) were payable to these funds and are included within other creditors in note 17.

26 Related entity transactions

The Federal Executive is chaired by the President of the Party to whose office the Federal Party paid grants in the year amounting to £11,209 (2015: £7,670).

The Federal Party is related to other bodies within the Liberal Democrats as set out in note 1 above. During the year it received levies from these bodies amounting to £971,519 (2015: £808,397) and recharged expenditure totalling £867,108 (2015: £949,486). Expenditure includes grants to party bodies, expenditure recharged to other party bodies and charges from other party bodies totalling £377,240 (2015 - £557,253).

Included in newspaper income is an amount of £nil (2015: £21,000) received from the Alliance of Liberals and Democrats for Europe (ALDE) for promoting ALDE in Ad Lib.
