#### Political Report 2017

Following the revelations around the RHI scandal and associated concerns Sinn Féin took decisive political action and withdrew from the Executive in January.

In the subsequent Assembly election in March 2017 Sinn Féin further consolidated its position as the second largest Party in the north.

In the snap Westminster election in June 2017 Sinn Féin continued to consolidate its political representation and strength, increasing its number of MPs from 4 to 7.

Sinn Féin was involved in negotiations throughout the whole of 2017 on a daily basis. These negotiations were primarily with the British Government and the DUP. They also involved negotiations with the Irish Government and the other political Parties in the north.

Sinn Féin engaged with a wide range of organisations and individuals across the political, cultural, sporting, educational and labour sectors.

There was a particular focus on rights based issues across all sections of society. This entailed dedicated meetings with representatives from a range of groups including the LGBT community and Irish language campaigners. The Party participated in a series of rallies and public meetings in support of these and other rights based issues.

Sinn Féin was very proactive through the work of its MPs and MEPs in Westminster, the European Parliament and beyond in relation to the fallout from the Brexit referendum.

Sinn Féin continued its international outreach and promotion of the political and peace processes in Ireland. Sinn Féin representatives and delegations were involved in a range of engagements across Europe, in particular in the Basque Country and Catalonia, North and South America and the Middle East.

Sinn Féin held its annual Ard Fheis in Dublin. There was a major focus on the Party following the announcement of long standing Party President, Gerry Adams, of his intention to stand down from that position.

In preparation for an anticipated referendum on the Eight Amendment to the Irish constitution Sinn Féin mobilised support and campaigned for a yes vote.

#### **Statement of Treasurer's responsibilities**

The treasurer of the Party is required by the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the Party and of its surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the treasurer is required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it's inappropriate to presume that the party will continue in business.

Section 41 of the Act requires that the Treasurer is responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the party at that time and to enable him to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Act. He is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the party and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### **Report of the Independent Auditors**

#### To the Treasurer of Sinn Fein

We have audited the financial statements of Sinn Fein for the year ended 31 December 2017 which have been prepared under the accounting policies set out.

#### **Respective responsibilities of the Treasurer and auditors**

The responsibilities of the Treasurer for preparing the annual report and financial statements in accordance with the applicable law and Accounting Standards are set out in the Statement of Treasurer's responsibilities.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the accounting policies. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Overview is not consistent with the financial statements, if the Party has not kept proper accounting records and if we have not received all the information and explanations we required for our audit.

We read the Overview and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it. Our responsibilities do not extend to any other information contained in the annual report

#### **Basis of audit opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Auditing Standard issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the Treasurer in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Party's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

#### Opinion

In our opinion the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of the Party's affairs as at 31 December 2017 and of it's deficit for the year ended 31 December 2017 and have been properly prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000.
